That means there are heaps of different ways you can watch it with others:

Stream and watch together

If you're still in lockdown or more comfortable with remote events, you can watch *Big Deal* together by streaming it with a video conferencing service like Zoom.

Host a watch party at home

If Covid restrictions permit, why not get together in person to watch together?

Decide if you'll watch one, or both parts, and make sure to plan some time for a discussion afterwards!

Watch in your own time then discuss.

If it's hard to find a time to watch Big Deal together, you can set a time for a discussion and let your friends or family watch in their own time.

Setting the time for a discussion creates a deadline for watching, while also giving everyone the flexibility to watch when it suits them.

WHO WILL YOUWATCH WITH?

Because Big Deal has such a strong and inspiring message of people power, think about the people you know who are concerned about these issues, but cautious about taking action themselves.

You can of course invite people you know who already feel the urgency of, and are active on, these issues. But if we can activate those who are almost there, even better!

Where do you think your local Member of Parliament stands on these issues?

What actions could we take to support a healthy democracy?

Lobbying is a billion-dollar industry in Australia

Over the past two decades, \$1 billion of donations to political parties have been from undisclosed sources.

Actually, Australia has one of the worst sets of political donation laws in the developed world.


ABOUT FOSSIL FUEL INFLUENCE


Between 2016-2019, donations from the fossil fuel industry to major parties **more than doubled.**

In the year leading up to the Morrison Government's 'gas fired recovery', **the gas industry gave \$698,339 to the major parties.**

Woodside Energy was the biggest fossil fuel donor in 2019/20, giving \$197,750 to the Liberal and National parties, \$137,665 to Labor 32% of the total income declared by political parties was 'dark money' (it has no identifiable source). In 2019, the fossil fuel industry donated \$708,000 to the Coalition, and **\$585,000 to Labor**
